EXECUTIVE MESSAGE

2025 was a year of tremendous growth for the Thorold Community Activities Group (TCAG). 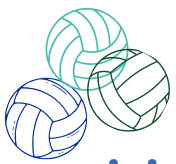

OUR PROGRAMS & SERVICES



Sports & Recreation

We provide 2,600+ diverse sport, recreation, and arts classes annually that cater to individuals of all ages, mobility levels, and fitness abilities, ensuring there's something for everyone to enjoy!



Camps

From PD Day to March Break to Summer camps, we inspire growth in over 1,400 children annually. Through fun activities, experiential learning, and weekly fieldtrips, our camps create memories that last a lifetime.



Youth Leadership

We ignite future leaders through our unique Leaders-in-Training program, providing scaffolded pathways for youth ages 12-15 to learn and practice leadership skills, gain certifications, and feel ready for their futures.



Community Partnership

We value collaboration. Last year we supported 850 community group participants, partners, and fellow charities through free space, partnerships, joint programming, and public events.



Childcare

We nurture a safe and stimulating environment for 120 children annually through our licensed and CWELCC-enrolled childcare facility, with a second location in South Niagara to open in 2027.



Food Security

We distribute shelf-stable food and hygiene products year-round through our 24/7 Free Community Pantry; our Pop-Up Produce Markets provide affordable, fresh produce to the public every month.

STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY ACROSS GENERATIONS

➔ NEW YOUTH PROGRAMS

This year, we were proud to expand the variety of programs offered for youth, creating more opportunities for young people to learn, connect, and grow within our community. By introducing seven new classes, we were able to engage youth in experiences exploring different interests, talents, and goals that help them feel included, supported, and confident.

Youth Beach Volleyball

This skills-development program is open to the public and includes co-ed and female/female-identifying groups for youth ages 6-12. Kids build volleyball skills in a non-competitive environment focusing on fun and fitness with an experienced volleyball instructor.



Racquet Sports

Our program gives youth ages 7 and older the opportunity to learn and explore tennis, badminton, and pickleball in a safe and inclusive environment. Trying a variety of racquet sports helps kids discover what they truly enjoy while building a lifelong appreciation for sport.

Junior Art Club

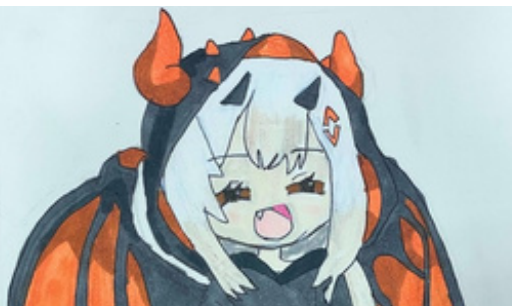
Our Junior Art Club invites kids ages 9 and up to experiment with their creativity through various art projects. This program is a great opportunity for youth to unleash their imagination and create fun and expressive projects while growing as artists.



STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY ACROSS GENERATIONS

MULTIGENERATIONAL PROGRAMS

Our multigenerational programming brings together participants of all ages! These programs foster social connection and strengthen community bonds by encouraging generations to work together toward shared goals. They also support aging in place by helping older adults remain engaged in their communities, while creating opportunities for younger generations to learn from their experience and knowledge.



Multigenerational Anime Art Class

This program gives participants ages 10+ the opportunity to learn to draw their favourite characters in a fun and inclusive setting. While building their drawing skills through creative projects, participants of all ages learn from each other and build connections with other who have similar interests and passions.

Woodcarving

Woodcarving classes for ages 9+ teach the basics of woodcarving in a fun, relaxing, and creative space. Many participants have entered into competitions and received recognition for their artwork.



Multigenerational Puppy Yoga

In partnership with Bridgewater Yoga, we invite participants ages 6 and up for a cuddly Puppy Yoga class! This multigenerational program offers an inclusive class for all experience levels, surrounded by adorable puppies.

Multi-Gen Art Class

Our program is designed for pairs of individuals of all ages to build connections and express their creativity while learning about diverse art styles and techniques together. As the class progresses, participants' creativity and interpretations develop into different and beautiful works of art.



EVERY CHILD, EVERY CHANCE

FREE YOUTH PROGRAMMING



DID YOU KNOW...?

260 kids were empowered through free, fun sports skills programs in 2025! After participating in these programs, kids feel more confident and prepared to participate in school and community sports leagues.

This year we were fortunate to receive grant funding to provide **free YOUTH in Sport programs** open to all children in our community, regardless of socioeconomic circumstance, membership status, or affiliation with our facility. **By removing financial and participation barriers**, these programs create opportunities to participate in quality sport and recreation experiences that may otherwise be out of reach, helping **ensure every child has the chance to learn, grow, and be active in a supportive environment.**



We were struggling to find a sport our daughter really has interest in and we tried basketball and now she LOVES it!

We didn't have the budget to register him before, and thanks to this program he had the opportunity to. My son attended for the first time to a basketball class and he realized he likes it and enjoys it!



Jumpstart Canada - Basketball

Thanks to Jumpstart Canada, the TCAG offered four classes - Co-Ed and Female and Female-Identifying - for ages 6 to 12 years old. This program was geared towards youth of all skill and experience levels and helped kids develop basic Basketball skills through hands-on experience in a positive and engaging environment.

EVERY CHILD, EVERY CHANCE

FREE YOUTH PROGRAMMING



Golf Ontario

The TCAG partnered with Golf Ontario to provide **four free golf programs to over 90 youth ages 6 to 17**. Kids learn the fundamentals of golf through fun games and activities while developing important character traits and values like leadership and confidence. These sessions remove barriers and **provide a safe, diverse, and inclusive environment for youth of all ages and abilities**.

My children had the opportunity to participate in a sport that they've never tried. They loved learning new skills and making friends. Because I cannot work, things can get tight financially. Jays Care Baseball Skills Program

Thanks to the Jays Care Foundation, we were able to offer a Girls at Bat and Co-Ed RBI program with over 20 participants ages 6 to 12 years old.

The Girls at Bat program, aimed at female and female-identifying youth, is designed to **empower and develop the leadership skills of girls in sport**.

The Co-Ed RBI program for youth of all ages **creates an inclusive, mixed-ability, and safe environment for everyone to participate**. This program ensures youth feel included in sport programming, and empowers learning and connection with teammates through friendship and teamwork. With an emphasis on leadership skills, participants develop self-confidence and a love of sport.



INCLUSION IN ACTION

PROGRAMS DESIGNED WITH INCLUSION AT THE CORE

The Inclusion Instructor role was created as a permanent position on our recreation staff 3 years ago and has had a tremendous impact on the children and families the TCAG supports, as well as our program instructors.

The Inclusion Instructor collaborates closely with the program instructors to offer expertise in social-emotional practices and strategies, and are available in every youth recreation program to **work 1:1 with children who need extra support**. They understand the diverse needs of all participants and provide guidance on how to modify activities and materials **to create an inclusive environment where everyone can thrive**.

By fostering a sense of belonging and celebrating diversity, the **inclusion role helps kids build confidence, develop new skills, and form meaningful connections with peers**.



INCLUSION IN ACTION

INCLUSION INSTRUCTORS



“

As an inclusion instructor with TCAG, I support youth with diverse needs including Autism, Down Syndrome, and other developmental and emotional challenges, in fully participating in sports, cooking, baking, art, and community programs. By getting to know the youth who come to our community centre, I use inclusive individualized strategies such as movement breaks, breathing techniques, and redirection to help participants build confidence, develop emotional regulation skills and engage meaningfully alongside their peers.

My role is not only to support access but also empower youth with tools they can apply in their everyday lives, fostering independence and a strong sense of belonging. Although I support youth with diverse needs, my role extends beyond this as I support all youth who come to the TCAG. This work is deeply important to me because it reflects my commitment to kindness, compassion, and inclusion, ensuring every child feels valued and supported.

TCAG camps are unique because we offer a variety of new weekly day trips, along with daily swimming at the City of Thorold pool. We feature exciting weekly themes that families get to enjoy seeing come to life, such as our music video premiere, and we recognize camper responsibility and engagement through our Camper of the Week program. Counsellor participation is a big part of the fun as well, including a fashion show where campers create the outfits!

Our day camp programming has grown significantly over the years **from 50 to 165 campers daily**, largely due to the dedication and hard work of Jennifer in the early stages, and later supported by her team—Stephanie, Alex, Julia, and Danielle. Their commitment as camp supervisors and, for some, growth into camp director roles has played a key part in this success.



It has grown **from a camp with 50 campers run entirely indoors** in our gym with little to no structure, limited activities, and minimal outdoor play **to a highly sought-after and engaging program for 165 kids weekly**. Every year parents eagerly anticipate registration day hoping to secure all the weeks because their kids absolutely LOVE TCAG Camp!

CAMP STAFF



Since 2017 when the new camp leadership team was hired, **we had a vision of growing the camp program through structured programs and activities** created around fun, educational topics in a variety of genres. We have:

- Created new training modules for staff.
- Included all staff in the program planning portion of our camps.
- Developed a strong foundation to build off of for future camps.
- Introduced a new structure, including policies and procedures that were incorporated into all camp programs (PD Day, Holiday, and March Break) at the TCAG.

The core leaders have remained and still oversee the program today. They are committed individuals that have grown and shaped our program, **always putting the children first and offering them an experience they will always remember.** They focus on values and morals, being role models and teaching in a positive manner, building the trusting relationships. With a focus on fun and learning, the camp program has grown far beyond what we could have imagined. **We stay focused on quality not quantity and continue to shape the program from our strong foundation built by an amazing team.**

GROWING TOMORROW'S LEADERS TODAY

LEADERS-IN-TRAINING PROGRAM

The TCAG's Leaders-in-Training (LIT) program empowers youth ages 12+ to build leadership, teamwork, and community engagement skills through interactive, hands-on learning. Beginning in June, with most training taking place from July to August, **the six-level program offers scaffolded sessions featuring workshops, mentorship, training, team projects, and community service.** Throughout the year, participants continue developing and applying their skills through community events and activities, with opportunities to progress toward leading younger participants and career-readiness upon completion.

Career-Readiness

Our program addresses youth employment barriers by providing integrated trainings as a core part of the program.

Participants gain:

- Certifications (First Aid/CPR, High Five-Principles of Healthy Child Development, Babysitting Certification).
- Jobs-based skills-building training (interviewing skills, public speaking, 5 Keys to Resiliency).
- Experience job shadowing to ensure career readiness as they reach the minimum age of work.

Mentorship & Hands-On Experience

As LITs progress through the program, they apply their learning within our summer camps by taking on leadership roles with younger campers while supervised and mentored by camp staff. Through a combination of practical exercises, workshops, and training, our LIT counselors guide participants through a transformative experience.

The TCAG's Child Care opened in 1988, originally located within Thorold High School. **We provide a safe and nurturing environment for 154 children annually so they can explore, learn, and grow**, while also fostering meaningful connections among families within the community.

Our registered Early Childhood Educators are selected for their passion for working with children and their commitment to supporting each child's growth and success. We take pride in our culturally diverse staff and families. We celebrate this diversity through a variety of activities and events, including Diversity Day, Orange Shirt Day, and Black History Month.

HANDS-ON EXPERIENCES THAT MATTER

PLACEMENT & CO-OP STUDENTS

Early childhood education students gain significant benefits from practicing in our child care centre because it allows them to connect theory with real-world experience. By working directly with children, students develop practical skills such as communication, classroom management, and the ability to plan and implement age-appropriate activities.

The TCAG's hands-on environment also helps them understand child development more deeply, as they observe different learning styles, behaviors, and developmental stages in action. Additionally, practicing in a childcare centre builds confidence and professionalism, as **students learn how to interact with families, collaborate with experienced educators, and respond to unexpected situations.**



Overall, this experience **prepares students to become more competent, reflective, and effective early childhood educators.** This partnership is mutually beneficial for both the students and our organization as it not only supports their professional growth, but also creates a valuable opportunity for us to identify and recruit skilled graduates already familiar with our environment and practices.

I began at the TCAG as a placement student for Brock University, and from there was hired on as a youth instructor. Eventually, the TCAG created a part-time role of Recreation Coordinator to handle social media and promotional content, summer programming, and events. VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

TCAG's growing volunteer program brings together people from diverse backgrounds; these fantastic individuals generously **contribute their skills across a wide range of community initiatives**, including pop-up produce markets, our community garden, local events, and organizational leadership through the Board of Directors.

In 2025, 59 fantastic volunteers built connections with various community partners while helping children, families, older adults, and individuals in impactful ways. 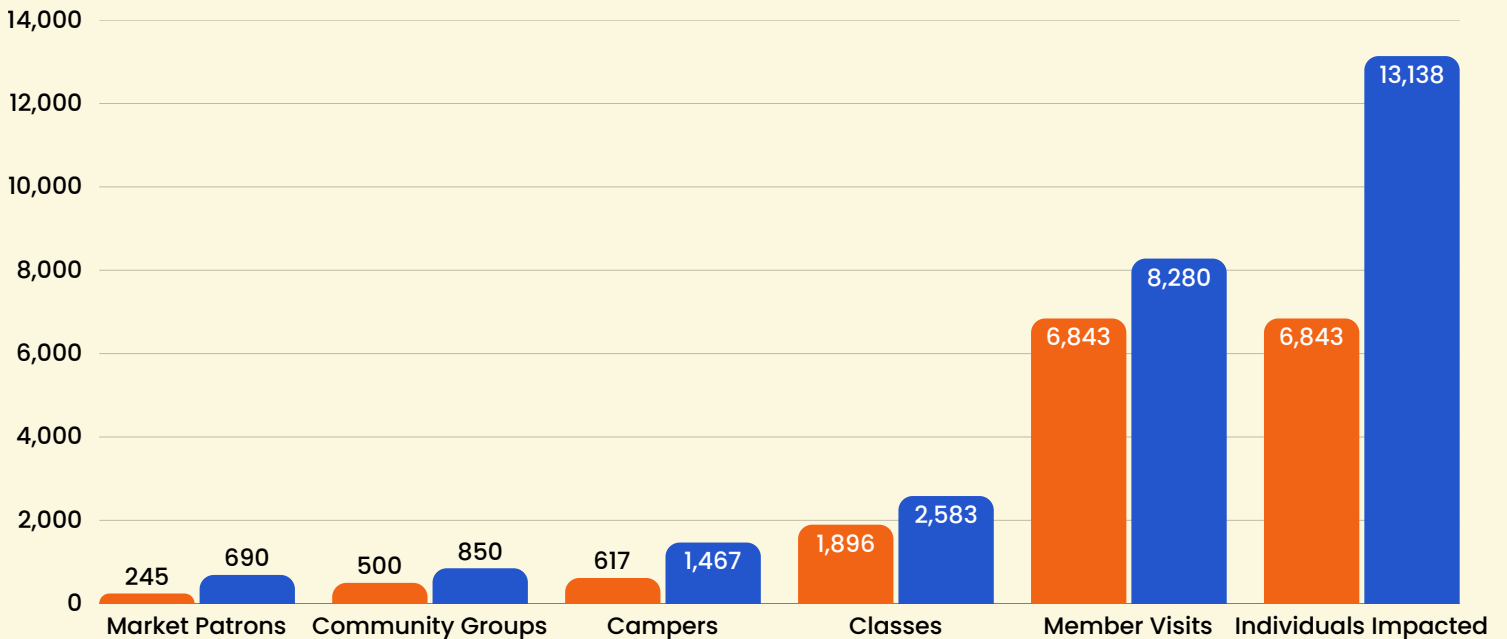

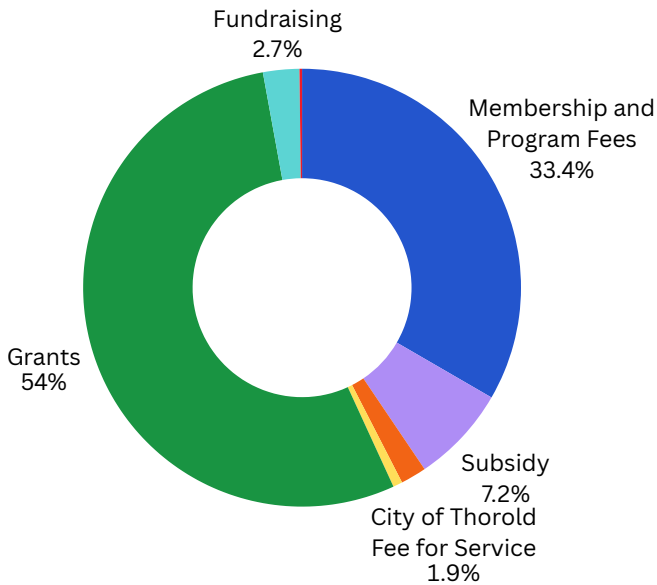

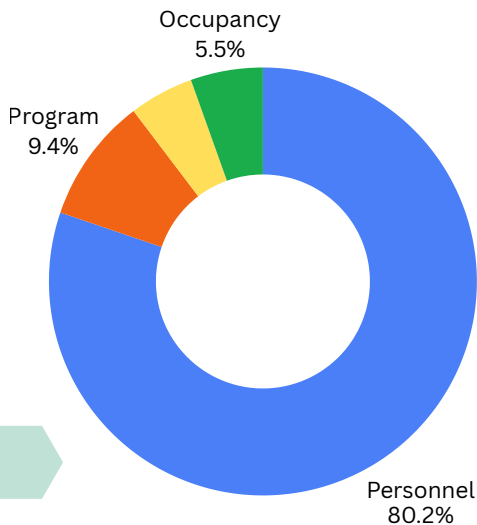
FINANCIALS

With a total operating budget of over 2.2 million per year, 91 employees and 53 contracted instructors, the TCAG is one of Thorold's largest Nonprofit employers. In 2025, the TCAG's activities generated over \$2.8 million in economic impact, and operated with a 140% ROI for every dollar of grant funding received.
