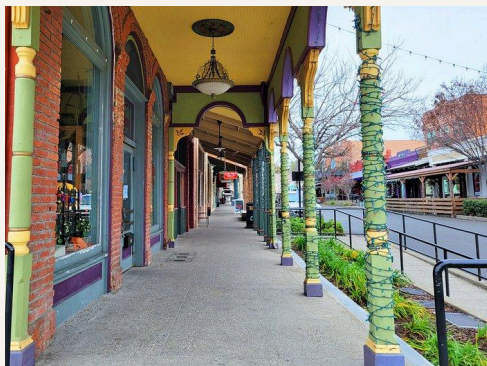

Roseville's reborn downtown core, anchored by Vernon Street Town Square — 100-plus concerts, markets and events a year, the Blue Line Arts gallery, and 15+ creative places to eat. Lively and very walkable.

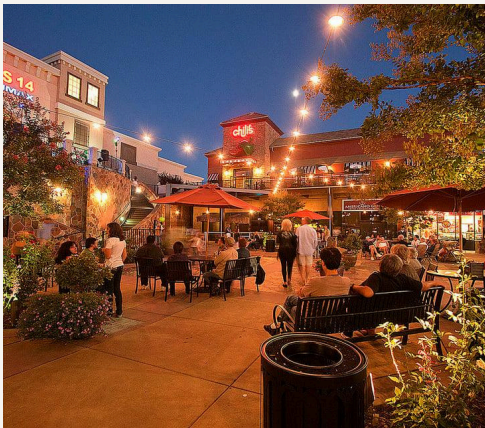


Historic Placerville
